Dear Friends

I miss seeing each of you in the flesh! My hug quota is very low and the kids (and Ashley) are tired of me asking for hugs! Simply stated, I cannot wait until we are reunited in the flesh.

In the space we occupy until our reunion, the non-linear progression of grief (based on the work of Elizabeth Kubler-Ross and David Kessler) provides a helpful lens to see our life in this age of Corona.

The original steps, Denial -> Anger -> Depression -> Bargaining -> Acceptance are drivers that do not act linear, but cyclically. Anyone who has walked the dark road of grief knows exactly what this circular arch is all about. Just when you think you have accepted our "stay-in-place" order, you are bargaining that if we keep washing our hands it will not last until June 10<sup>th</sup> (yikes!).

As uncomfortable as the above is to acknowledge (who wants to say I'm grieving), it is comforting to acknowledge that Jesus wept at the tomb of Lazarus and weeps with us. God weeps with us right now – pause, and let that sink in.

So while we are in this pandemic we know one true fact, and that is that God is with us. He hung on the cross and entered hell so that we would know that whatever life gives to and takes from us, there is no place that is without the love and presence of Jesus. Now, pause and let that sink in.

Not only is He with us, but we, too, will be resurrected when we breathe our last. The ending of the pandemic is unknown, but our story has already been written. Heaven. Now, pause and let that sink in and let God's love wash over you.

Back to grief, Kessler is working on another step in the circular life of grief: Meaning. Kessler writes about meaning:

I wanted meaning in those darkest hours. And I do believe we find light in those times. Even now people are realizing they can connect through technology. They are not as remote as they thought. They are realizing they can use their phones for long conversations. They're appreciating walks. I believe we will continue to find meaning now and when this is over.

It is in these places of meaning that we see those little rays of hope that pierce through the fear, nerves, and uncertainty. Meaning gives way to laughter, love, hope and God.

David Brooks captured this idea in a recent column:

It's the story we tell about this moment. It's the way we tie our moment of suffering to a larger narrative of redemption. It's the way we then go out and stubbornly live out that story. The plague today is an invisible monster, but it gives birth to a better world.

There it is, or as Paul wrote, "I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us."

What will be revealed? Easter. Eternal Life and full communion with God and all the saints in light. **Easter Joy to each of you along with many virtual hugs!**

# FEELING DISCONNECTED? HERE'S HOW TO CONNECT

If you have access to a desktop computer, laptop computer, or smart phone or tablet w that are connected to the internet, you can watch Willis's sermons, participate in the 88 W Brown Bag Bible Studies and in the Wednesday night Evening Prayer Services. Here's how:

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First, you need to go to this website on your computer: <a href="https://zoom.us/">https://zoom.us/</a>

Once there, you will need to sign up using your e-mail address and create a password (write it down!). When the time comes for the service or meeting, Willis will set up the "meeting" and send you an email "invitation". If you scroll down a ways it will say "join zoom meeting" and there will be a link for you to click and a meeting ID number. That should take you to the meeting. Also, you do not need to 🕨 "stream" the service to join in virtually. Simply call in as if it's a conference call (there will be a phone number for this purpose).

💓 You can also visit the website and on the right hand side of the home page, see the box which says "virtual Church links". Click on the one you want. PDF versions of the bulletins are on the home page also.

How about Julian of Norwich?


How about Martin Luther (well, that's not you've heard of Luther, but he's too fair. good not to include)
