GOOD NEWS LETTER

Dear Friends,

He forgives all your sins * and heals all your infirmities; Psalm 103:3

Do you remember the first time that you received absolute forgiveness? In other words, absolution from your sins/mistakes. As an example, in our marriages, we tend to be a revolving door of forgiveness. After all, living with another sinful human will create some tension!

We harbor grudges, hurt feelings, sadness towards one another and these emotions become corrosive. Both sides of the equation are affected by the sins. The receiver of the event holds the grudge and anger towards the perpetrator who feels the remorse and sadness for the action. It's a lose-lose setup.

These emotions become rust that corrode the deepest regions of our soul.

The anti-venom to a virus of resentment and hurt is -- "I am sorry" and hearing the response, "It's okay." Or "I accept your apology, thank you." Those moments are transformative and deeply cathartic. Many times they are not easy, but the rush of love and emotion that explodes in a real forgiveness conversation or drips out over time is the healing balm of the soul.

The powerful words of the Psalmist speak to the connection between "forgiveness" and "infirmities." Connecting our sins to our health is an actual reality for us (or we are ignoring those pains of years ago or yesterday!). However, the Psalmist isn't just descriptive of the connection between sin and health; the writer tells us of the "He" who forgives us of our sins. The "He" is Jesus Christ, and He calls you to His Doctor's Office, where he inoculates and treats your sin with love, kindness, and mercy; one hundred percent grace. This is our new reality under Jesus - an internal and external truth. The power of forgiveness will change our lives and the lives of those who we love.

Thank you, Jesus.

Prayer Power
