Honduras Medical Mission Plans

Plans are in the final stages for the 24th Honduras Medical Mission, sponsored by St. Mark's, Fincastle, Church of the Good Shepard, Galax, and churches in Arizona, Alaska and Florida. We give thanks to the Lord for this opportunity to once again to serve and praise him in this way. Thanks to St. Mark's, the medical mission has been granted a Global Goals matching grant of \$2,000 from the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia to support efforts to improve the lives of women, children and families around the world. Thank you for your support!

The mission team of 17 medical professionals and other professionals volunteering in the pharmacy, vision clinic, water filter program and dental clinic are busy preparing themselves, getting inoculations, buying airline tickets and packing supplies for the mission. Supplies include medications, prescription eyeglasses, sun glasses, readers, Sawyer Water Filters, Bibles, Sunday School materials, toothbrushes, dental floss, finger nail clippers and coloring books and crayons to occupy the children while waiting to be seen or pick up their prescriptions. The Bishop of Honduras, Lloyd Allen and the priest and parishioners of San Marcos provide local support, and high school students from the Episcopal school in Puerto Cortes serve as interpreters. This year, for the first time, 2 dentists from Puerto Cortes will provide dental care for the patients. They will be assisted by a third year dental student who is the son of the Senior Warden at San Marcos. This cooperative plan of the mission team working with professionals of the community supports mission goals of helping women, children and families as well as the goal of the Diocese of Honduras to reach self sufficiency by 2019. With continued support of all kinds and prayers, we hope to assist them in that goal.

In addition to the various clinics provided by the mission, the team often provides assistance with construction and repairs. Having over 600 people use bathrooms and muddy sidewalks demands regular upkeep. This year the team hopes to repair the vanities in the 2 bathrooms.

Honduras is a beautiful, fertile country, but the 2nd poorest country in the Americas. People

can seldom afford medical care, if they can find it. This medical mission offers the only medical care available in the rural area of Omoa and San Marcos. Without this effort, there would be no care for hundreds of families.

Can you be part of this mission?
